

<u> President's Comments – Michael Wilson</u>

Now that the fall season is upon us and school is in session, our chairmen of various S.A.R. Youth Education programs are hard at work to find that prefect candidate to compete at the state and national level and need your support. How, you say? One way is by getting the word out to our local community (*churches, youth groups, schools*) about the eight (8) different Youth Awards Programs (*see brochure below*).

The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution has eight (8) categories within the Youth Award Program: Dr. Tom & Betty Lawrence Teacher Award; the Arthur M. and Berdena King Eagle Scout Program; the Americanism Poster contest; Outstand JROTC Cadet award; the George S. & Stella M. Knight essay contest; the SGT. Moses Adams Memorial Middle School Brochure contest; the Joseph S. Rumbaugh Historical Oration contest; and the Children of the American Revolution award. Each of these programs promote character, increase the confidence of tomorrow's leaders, foster civic responsibility in today's youth, and emphasize the development of critical thinking skills.

Last year, the chapter won first place at the state level at the *Virginia Sons of the American Revolution 2023 Annual Meeting* on February 10th through 12th in South Boston, Virginia, for the *Outstanding JROTC Cadet* and the *Arthur M. and Berdena King Eagle Scout* contests. This is due to the hard work of Tim Cline who chairs the chapter's *Eagle Scout Recognition* program and John Callaway who chairs the chapter's *ROTC/JROT/Sea Cadet* program, respectively. Both have done a spectacular job the past two years and are now seeking out this year's candidates.

To better assist our Youth Award Program, the executive officers of the chapter have created a Challenge Coin Program – fundraising through the sale of a challenge coin—your choice, either with the image of Colonel William Grayson and the seal of State Society on the opposing side, and/or another challenge coin having the image of a 17th century colonial soldier with the Latin phrase "*Aut Liber, Aut Nullus*" next to him and the George Washington's Inaugural Button on the opposing side. Both challenge coins' sales support funding of the **Permanent Fund** and **Youth Funds** within the Colonel William Grayson Chapter and will be available for purchase at the October Chapter meeting. Should you not be able to attend and wish to support the Permanent fund and Youth Funds program, please contact the chapter Treasurer, Secretary, or myself.

Special thanks to Past President William C. Collier and the Colonel William Grayson Compatriots that support and assist in the chapter's Public Safety and Heroism Program. And thank you to each chapter officer that dedicates their time to keep this chapter great.

DR. TOM & BETTY LAWRENCE AMERICAN HISTORY **TEACHER AWARD**

(Educators for Grades 5-12)

The Dr. Tom & Betty Lawrence American History Teacher Award winner will attend one of the

- following graduate summer seminars: Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, Valley Forge, PA
- Colonial Williamsburg at Williamsburg, VA Jefferson Symposium at University of Virginia,
- SAR Annual Conference on the American

Revolution Judges will choose one award winner each at the elementary, middle, and high school levels. The teacher will represent classroom instruction that outperforms curriculum requirements for the Revolutionary War era 1750-1800.Winners qualify for a cash award upon the successful completion of the summer seminar.

THE ARTHUR M. AND BERDENA KING EAGLE SCOUT PROGRAM (Eagle Scout prior to 19th birthday during

year of application) Competition is open to all Eagle Scouts registered in an active unit. The year that the scout received In an active unit. The year that the scout received the Eagle rank is unrestricted. Application year is 01 January to 31 December and conducted in three phases, local (Chapter), State (Society), and National levels. Judging begins at the local Chapter with the submitted entry that includes an application form, four-generation ancestry chart, and a 500-word patriotic themed essay. Firstplace winner will receive recognition and presented either a cash award or scholarship to an educational institution at the SAR Annual Congress.

THE AMERICANISM POSTER CONTEST

(Grades 3-5) The contest is open to public, private, parochial, charter, and home-schooled students as well as C.A.R., Cub Scouts, and Brownies at the grade level that includes the American Revolution curriculum. Permanent themes are "Revolutionary War Events" for even numbered school years, and "Revolutionary War Persons" for odd numbered years. Judging is based upon theme portrayal, originality, research evidence, neatness, artistic merit, and creativity. All competition begins at the local SAR Chapter level with National winners receiving a ribbon, certificate, and cash award.

OUTSTANDING JROTC CADET AWARD

(Nominated cadet must be a High School Junior) This award fosters the principle of "citizen-soldier" as exemplified by the American Revolution's Minuteman. Selection process begins with the JROTC Unit's Senior Military Instructor (SMI). Selection criteria includes demonstrated leadership potential, military bearing, and scholastic achievement. Each cadet must submit an original essay on a topic designated by the SAR ROTC / JROTC & Services Academy Liaison Committee. The unit's JROTC Commanding Officer will select the winning Outstanding JROTC camera.

THE GEORGE \$. & STELLA M. KNIGHT ESSAY CONTEST

(Grades 9-12) Competition is open to public, private, parochial, and home-school high school students interested in the American Revolution. Students must submit an original 800 to 1,200-word essay based on an event, person, philosophy or ideal associated with the American Revolution, Declaration of Independence, or the framing of the US Constitution. Student essays are judged based upon their historical accuracy, clarity, organization, grammar and spelling, and documentation. Competition begins at the local SAR Chapter level and progresses through the State Society and National levels. The winning essay will be submitted to the SAR Magazine for publication.



THE SGT. MOSES ADAMS MEMORIAL MIDDLE SCHOOL **BROCHURE CONTEST**

(Grades 6-9)

The contest is open to middle school students in public, private, parochial, charter and home-school at the grade level containing American Revolution or Government curriculum. C.A.R., Boy Scouts, and Girl Scouts in these grade levels are also eligible. The permanent theme is "The Founding Documents of the United States." They are: Articles of Confederation, Declaration of Independence, Federalist Papers, US Constitution, and Bill of Rights. All competition begins at the local SAR Chapter level with National winners receiving a ribbon, certificate, and cash award.

THE JOSEPH S. RUMBAUGH **HISTORICAL ORATION** CONTEST

(Grades 9-12)

Competition is open to all public, private, parochial, and home-school high school students to perpetuate the stories of patriotism, courage, tragedy, and triumph of the men and women who achieved America's independence. Students must write an original oration of not less than five minutes or more than six minutes. The student must present their oration to an audience without the use of notes or props. The oration's subject shall be an event, a personality, or a document pertaining to the Revolutionary War with an emphasis on our nation's 250th anniversary. Judging will be based on composition, delivery, significance, historical accuracy, and relevance to our 250th anniversary. Preliminary rounds begin at the Chapter level with winning entries advancing to the State Society and National levels where SAR awards scholarships and cash prizes.

THE CHILDREN OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION AWARD

(C.A.R. member)

This award is presented to C.A.R. members who have performed outstanding service in the furthering of the principles of freedom, and knowledge about and appreciation of the American Revolution, and in supporting C.A.R. goals at local Chapter, State Society, and National levels.

<u> Vice President's Corner – Andrew Mills</u>

This past July I attended the 133rd SAR Congress in Orlando, Florida. Joining me in this experience were past Chapter President Michael Weyler, Historian Charles Mills, and Quartermaster Jack Mills. As a first timer going to an event such as this, I truly did not know what to expect when I arrived.

In a previous newsletter, our current Chapter President, Michael Wilson, discussed being green dotted, a custom whereby first-time attendees to SAR conferences receive a green dot to put on their name tag to let other members know it was their first time. For this Congress, there were many first timers there who all had the privilege of getting to personally meet with the outgoing President General C. Bruce Pickette.

During this Congress, several topics were discussed amongst the delegates. These topics included funding renovations at the National Headquarters, reevaluating the status of the International Society for the SAR, and the one which drew the most scrutiny: raising of dues. The issue of the dues was greatly debated amongst the delegates for almost two full sessions before being resolved. Yet Congress is not just a time for people to sit in a large ballroom and discuss the working parts of the SAR.

Before the first session of Congress, the SAR held a solemn memorial service for those Compatriots for whom we lost over the course of the past year. This moving tribute saw nearly seventy members of the Color Guard muster and take an active part in the event.

Each evening there were social gatherings to bring members from across the country together to get to know each other and learn from each other about what happens in their respective states. The final two evenings saw two separate banquets honoring both the outgoing and incoming President General.

The true take away from this Congress was that if you had never been to one before, a compatriot should make the effort to participate in a Congress at least once. The irony is that once you have been to one you will more likely want to go to the next Congress. Luckily for us, the 2024 Congress is being held in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. The drive there is approximately 3 hours and the earliest pieces of information being provided about the Congress indicate there were be special SAR tours of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Campaign for those who are attending the conference next year.

I hope many of you will come out to Lancaster next summer to take part in the 134th SAR Congress. I believe you will have a great time and an enjoyable experience.

<u> America 250th Committee – Ross Schwalm</u>

Planning for the Prince William County Revolutionary War Memorial has continued at a more detailed level. The County Landscape Architect crafted an initial drawing of park options in the land behind Williams Ordinary in Dumfries, VA.

The Design subcommittee met on June 14, 2023, at Williams Ordinary. An informal poll of visitors to William Ordinary indicated that a majority of folks prefer an obelisk monument over a memorial wall. Estimates were received for both options but the cost of the wall was considered prohibitive. The requirements list as written and approved is for an obelisk. The requirement list was sent to the landscape architect to craft a new diagram so we can include it in future fundraising efforts. The last major decision of the subcommittee was the deadline for park completion. This has been established as 2031, before the Yorktown 250th.

Registrar's Report - Mike Blythe



While driving though Schuylkill County, PA, Compatriot Ross Schwalm noticed a roadside display near a church. There were multiple signs with individual names and the America250 DAR logos were on each sign. Each sign listed a Revolutionary War Patriot and his service as a military man or function and the state in which the service was performed. This display was at Jacobs Lutheran Church and the signs reflected all of the known Patriots buried in the Jacobs Cemetery. A stone monument with a plaque was also located on this site.





July 9, 2023: America 250 event in Valley View, Pennsylvania

Compatriot Ross Schwalm hosted James and Dolley Madison at an America250 event in Valley View, Pennsylvania on July 9, 2023. August 22, 2023: Kutztown University becomes Home of Digital Military Archives, Kutztown, Pa.

Compatriot Ross Schwalm, a past president of the Colonel William Grayson Chapter, and current president of The Johannes Schwalm Historical Association, announced that Kutztown University has been selected to be the new home of a military archive collection from the American Revolution, courtesy of the Johannes Schwalm Historical Association. Rohrbach Library manages the digital collection, which launched in August. The collection is made up of thousands of pages of original documents from the United States, Britain and Germany.

The Johannes Schwalm Historical Association is a nonprofit organization dedicated to researching those German auxiliary troops (generically called Hessian) who remained in America after the Revolutionary War, became loyal citizens, made cultural contributions and were the progenitors of any thousands of Americans living today.

August 26, 2023: Commemoration of the Battle of Brooklyn, NY: National Event

The Battle of Long Island, also known as the Battle of Brooklyn and the Battle of Brooklyn Heights, was an action of the American Revolutionary War fought on August 27, 1776, at the western edge of Long Island in present-day Brooklyn. The British defeated the Continental Army and gained access to the strategically important Port of New York, which they held for the rest of the war. It was the first major battle to take place after the United States declared its independence on July 4, 1776, in Philadelphia. It was the largest battle of the Revolutionary War in terms of both troop deployment and combat.

On August 26, 2023, Compatriot Ross H. Schwalm traveled with the Maryland SAR members on a bus trip to an event in remembrance of the Battle of Brooklyn of August 27, 1776. The event was held at the Old Stone House and was attended by Maryland National Guard members whose unit is the lineal descendant of the 1st Maryland Regiment, American Legion members, VFW members, reenactors, MD, NJ, NY, and VA SAR which included a combined color guard, NY DAR, Maryland Society of the Cincinnati, representatives of the NY City Parks and Recreation Division and the public. The event centered around the Maryland 400 which was a subset of troops from the First Maryland Regiment (Old Main Line) which counterattacked British and Hessian Troops in order to allow General Washington's remaining troops to escape. Only eight men made it to safety with the rest of the 400 either killed or captured.

Compatriot Schwalm et al. also visited the 1st Maryland Regiment Monument in Prospect Park. This monument is placed near the spot where the regiment first encountered the British on the left and the Hessians on the right attempting to cut off a path of retreat.



September 9, 2023: 242nd Anniversary of the Battle of Virginia Capes

Chapter President Michael Wilson attended the 242nd anniversary Battle of the Virginia Capes and brought greetings on behalf of CWG and presented the Chapter wreath.


The Battle of the Chesapeake, also known as the Battle of the Virginia Capes or simply the Battle of the Capes, was a crucial naval battle in the War that took place near the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay on 5 September 1781. The battle was strategically decisive, in that it prevented the Royal Navy from reinforcing or evacuating the besieged forces of Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown, Virginia. The French were able to achieve control of the sea lanes against the British and provided the Franco-American army with siege artillery and French reinforcements. These proved decisive in the Siege of Yorktown.

September 21, 2023: Lifesaving Commendations to Fairfax County Police Department Officers

Compatriot Bill Collier presented two Lifesaving Commendations to Fairfax County Police Department Officers. Their citation read:

On December 28, 2022, PFC Taimur Mirza and MPO Gerard Sullivan of the Sully District Station responded to a suspicious person event where a subject was seen standing on the Poplar Tree Road overpass to Sully Road. PFC Mirza was the first to arrive on the scene and began a dialogue with the subject while MPO Sullivan assisted. The scene was very tense as the officers worked together to establish a rapport with the subject who was in a mental health crisis. The subject was talking about religion and made statements that he was going to die today. Additionally, both officers had to deal with traffic trying to maneuver around the incident. The traffic underneath them on Sully Rd was busy and required all lanes to be shut down below the bridge to protect citizens traveling below. The subject kept making statements to jump and was positioned on the opposite side of the guard rail, giving the impression that he was going to jump any second. He continued his dialogue with the officers and at one point looked down. PFC Mirza took this moment of opportunity to grab the subject as he was now straddling the guard rail, pulling him over to safety and securing him on the ground along with MPO Sullivan. The subject made a statement that was captured on Body Worn Camera, "I wanted to die, but you took that from me." The subject was transported to a mental health evaluation and received the treatment he needed. Police Officers are sometimes faced with stressful situations that require patience, quick thinking, and immediate action to save lives. PFC Mirza and MPO Sullivan demonstrated quick thinking and compassion towards a community member that was in a mental health crisis. The subject presented a danger not only to himself but to the people traveling below the bridge on Sully Rd which both officers had to take into consideration. MPO Sullivan and PFC Mirza remained calm during a highly stressful event. They demonstrated professionalism, teamwork, and dedication to save a life.

Historical Notes:

The British at Mount Vernon



In April, 1781 the British warship *H.M.S. Savage* anchored off George Washington's plantation, Mount Vernon. The British raiders took seventeen of Washington's slaves from the Mount Vernon plantation. Lund Washington, a cousin who was watching over the plantation during the General's absence, went on board the *Savage*, took refreshments to the British officers, and tried to negotiate the return of the slaves. He failed. A week later Lafayette wrote General Washington criticizing Lund's actions, "This being done by the gentleman who, in some measure, represents you at your house will certainly have a bad effect, and contrasts with spirited answers from some neighbors, that had their houses burnt accordingly." The General sent the unfortunate Lund a stinging letter rebuking him for "...communing with a parcel of plundering Scoundrels...."
