## President's Comments - Michael Wilson

This year's 134<sup>th</sup> Annual Congress (NSSAR) was held at the Marriot at Penn Square, Lancaster, Pennsylvania. Where I and my family were well received by the National officers and their wives, as this was mine and my family's first time attending. The most memorable event, by far, was Friday night's *Joseph S. Rumbaugh Oration* finalist contest. It was a true delight to witness such talent as each finalist "perpetuates the stories of patriotism, courage, and tragedy" in-person. Each presentation was amazing! Then we learned that the first-place winner had just fifteen minutes to prepare because of travel delays; this was jaw-dropping. All six days were full of business sessions, tours, Memorial Services and voting. Our chapter was recognized and awarded the *President General's Education Outreach Streamer*, while the students and teacher that competed and won our Chapter's *Dr. Tom & Betty Lawrence American History Teacher contest, The Arthur M. and Berdena King Eagle Scout contest, Outstanding JROTC Cadet, and the Joseph S. Rumbaugh Historical Oration* contest – also placing first at State, were recognized as National finalists in their respective categories. Dr. Michael Weyler, Chuck Mills, Andrew Mills, Jack Mills and their families were all elegantly stylish in their formal attire with decorations as compatriot Jack Mills carried the Georgia State flag as he participated in the NSSAR Color Guard opening ceremonies for the *President General's Banquet*, Sunday, July 14, 2023.

The next 135<sup>th</sup> Annual Congress will be hosted by the Connecticut Society in 2025; and in 2026 it will be hosted by North Carolina Society.

This year's VASSAR 2024 Semi-Annual was held at the Lodge Colonial Williamsburg; our chapter hosted seven workshops the weeks prior to the event, and we were recognized for our "exemplary service [in] ensuring

the success of the 2024 Semi-Annual meeting." The Virginia Society Board of Management graciously awarded our chapter with a Resolution of Thanks & Commendation certificate. And during the President's Awards Banquet held on Saturday night, September 14<sup>th</sup>, I had the honor of receiving Michael Blythe's Liberty Medal Certificate with Oak leaf Cluster, which I plan to present to him on October 12, 2024, during our Chapter meeting, at the VFW in Manassas, 11am – 1pm. Congratulations Mike!

With school now back in session, I look forward to working with our *Youth Awards Program* Chairmen and Committee members as we search Prince William County for the next contestants in the *George & Stella M. Knight Essay Contest, Joseph S. Rumbaugh Oration Contest, Middle School Brochure Contest, Elementary School Poster Contest, or the Eagle Scout & Scholarship or ROTC/JROTC Cadet Recognition programs. The Youth Award Programs promotes character, increases our youth's confidence in themselves, and promotes critical thinking skills, all while fostering civic responsibility.* 

And don't forget about the *Tom and Betty Lawrence American History Teacher of the Year*. We need great teachers to award, too! Print out a Youth Award Program (digital) flyer and distribute amongst various communities and churches. We need your support.

Lastly, our Americanism report is looking good but needs your entries! If you have participated in **Color Guard activities**, **National Historical site memorials and celebrations**, given **speeches/lectures** to the SAR, DAR or CAR chapters, other civic groups, other youth organizations or other entities, or even **financially contributed** to any of the society programs, please let George Axe (gaxsr39@outlook.com), our Americanism Report Chairman, or myself (mbwilson@icloud.com) know. Each compatriot's activities count as shown in the 2023 National Americanism results. For example, our chapter was ranked 10<sup>th</sup> out of 23 submissions for chapters of 150+ members within the National Society, with a total score of 8,711 last year. While third place went to an Alabama Society chapter with a total of 11,640, a difference of 2,930 points can set us apart in a National Society competition.

As we approach the fall season, our chapter treasurer, Jeff Windland, has by now sent each compatriot an email or letter informing us that our society membership dues are now payable via MemberClicks, PayPal, or by check. Chapter dues are still \$20, while State dues are \$30 and National dues are \$50. If you are a National Life Member, you should not have to pay the \$50 dues fee. Membership dues are due before December 31, 2024.

In closing, please join me in giving a warm welcome and congratulations to our newest chapter members: *John W. Collier, Dr. David L. Whittington, Brody L. Tuthill, Lanny Y. Tuthill, Scott B. Tuthill, Matthew R. Mosley, Robert F. Wagner and Stephen A. Stoops.* Also, the Board of Managers will be presenting the 2025 Colonel William Grayson Chapter Officer slate at the October 12, 2024, meeting, held at the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) 7589, Manassas during the hours of 11am – 1pm. ## Vice President's Corner - Andrew Mills

The 134<sup>th</sup> Congress took place this past July in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, and was a time which saw compatriots from across the country and, in some cases, from other parts of the world come together in solidarity to discuss the upcoming year for the Sons of the American Revolution.

The largest area of contention dealt with the issue of the application fees being raised. This topic proved to be a raucous and contentious issue as members weighed both the pros and cons of the fee raise. While many acknowledged the need to raise these fees as a method to help pay for the staff who works on these applications at the National Headquarters, others pointed out how this fee raise, in addition to last year's dues raise, can have an adverse effect on our organization as it can price current members out and prevent them from renewing their membership, but also make prospective members think twice about joining. The final vote on this measure was 127 in favor to 124 against.

The closeness of this vote highlighted the importance and value of every member's vote along with their participation in the SAR. As we get ready to bring 2024 to a close and start to think ahead for 2025, we should consider how our individual talents can best help the Chapter in the New Year. Is your hobby genealogy? Are you artistic? Perhaps you want to join the Color Guard. There are many opportunities available for you to help the Chapter. When compatriots take an active part in their Chapter, they discover how much fun there is coming out to events and the satisfaction of seeing a particular project come to completion.

Please consider looking at your personal calendars at home and seeing if you could volunteer a little time to the Chapter in many of our amazing committees or attend an event hosted by our Chapter or another Chapter. Your engagement with Chapter activities gives all of us more unity and strength as a Chapter and ensures the legacy of our Patriot ancestors lives on in the heart of our community.

## Registrar's Report - Mike Blythe

We welcome several new compatriots to the chapter whose applications were approved this summer: Stephen A. Stoops resides in Montclair and is a descendant of Peter Thompson who served as a private in the New Hampshire Militia.

As of 1 September, the cost of applying to the SAR increased to \$257: \$150 NSSAR new member application fee, \$50 first year's dues, \$12 VASSAR, and \$45 Col William Grayson Chapter. Junior Member applications increased to \$107: \$75 NSSAR application fee, \$5 first year's dues, \$12 VASSAR, and \$15 Col William Grayson Chapter.

The Color Guard was in exceptional form over the summer as our members repeatedly answered the call of duty when asked to support events throughout Virginia and beyond. During the 134<sup>th</sup> Congress, held in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, Compatriot Michael Weyler and I took part in the memorial service for compatriots who passed away over the last year. The march from the Convention Center to Trinity Church (distance of half a mile) saw almost seventy-five members of the National Color Guard march through the streets of Lancaster while the church bells rang out patriotic notes throughout the city. Inside the church, the organist played many patriotic songs, including the Star-Spangled Banner at the end of the memorial.

During Congress, Compatriots Ray Hawkins and Bud Wagner represented our Chapter at the Commemoration of the Essex Resolves.



### September 13 - 14, 2024: VASSAR Semi-Annual Meeting, Williamsburg, Va.


Compatriots Michael Wilson, George Ax, Sr., and Mike Weyler attended the VASSAR General Membership meeting

## **Historical Notes:**



Grave of the Marquis de Lafayette

An enslaved man in New Kent County known as James Armistead, learning that slaves who served the American cause could apply for freedom when the war ended, asked his owner William Armistead, an ardent

Patriot, if he could volunteer to serve with the Marquis de Lafayette's army defending Virginia against the British invasion of 1781. William Armistead agreed.

Lafayette, a long-time opponent of slavery who once wrote to George Washington, "I would never have drawn my sword in the cause of America if I could have conceived that thereby I was founding a land of slavery," found James Armistead very able and offered him a dangerous mission, namely to become a spy on the British. Posing as a runaway slave, Armistead made his way to the camp of the traitor Benedict Arnold at Portsmouth. Armistead offered his services as a guide and forager. The British accepted him.

James Armistead must have been a very persuasive individual because not only did he earn the trust of Benedict Arnold, but he also soon gained the trust of General Lord Cornwallis. Cornwallis made Armistead an orderly, which put him in the rooms where British military plans were being discussed. He passed that information to fellow spies who sneaked through the lines to deliver the intelligence to Lafayette.

In a strange turn of events, Lord Cornwallis now asked Armistead to spy on the Americans. He took up the offer and was now in the position of being able to supply the Americans with accurate information about British plans and capabilities, while feeding the British misinformation. Armistead's reports to Generals Lafayette and Washington were vital to the American victory at Yorktown.

After Yorktown, Armistead returned to the plantation on which he was enslaved. Although Virginia passed a manumission act in 1782 allowing any slave who fought in the Revolution to apply to become free, subsequent legislation limited manumission to slaves who had carried guns and been soldiers. James did not serve as a soldier, but as a spy, and so was not eligible for emancipation. His first petition was ignored.

James Armistead tried again in 1786. This time his petition was strongly supported by his owner William Armistead, now a member of the House of Delegates, and by a personal testimonial from the Marquis de Lafayette in favor of granting freedom based on service during the war. On January 9, 1787 James was declared a free man. Upon receiving the news he added "Lafayette" as his surname and was thereafter known as James Armistead Lafayette. James Armistead Lafayette became a successful farmer near Richmond. He was later granted an annual pension for his service during the Revolutionary War.

In 1824, the now sixty seven year old Marquis de Lafayette returned to the United States at the invitation of President James Monroe. His year-long tour of all 24 states was a magnificent patriotic celebration. He would be escorted between cities by the state militia, and would enter each town through newly built triumphal arches to be welcomed by huge crowds. There were special events, patriotic speeches, and celebratory dinners.

One of the cities Lafayette visited was Richmond. While making his way through the throngs of people in Richmond, he suddenly ordered his carriage to stop. He had seen his old comrade in arms James Armistead in the crowd. The Marquis de Lafayette left his carriage and made his way on foot through the crowd. After a separation of over forty years the two old veterans embraced.
